3. Overview of 2024 ed. Revisions

Most of the 29 chapters of NFPA 921, 2021 edition revised in the 2024 edition to some extent. A foundation of NFPA 921 is its "scope" as defined in Chapter 1 A Section 1.1 "Scope" has been broadened to recognize NFPA 921 is not only designed to assist investigators investigative duties concerning the "origin, cause, rest or prevention" of incidents, but also in investigating, an rendering opinions about "fire spread." Here are some takeaways of the revisions:

- On one end of the spectrum, three chapters have extensively revised or completely re-written, includ Chapter 6 Fire Effects and Fire Patterns, Chapter 1 Fire Investigator Safey, Health, and Wellness, and Chapter 27 Wildfire Investigations (together with a r Section on "Terminology Specific to Wildfire Investige
- ➤ On the other end of the spectrum, relatively few revis were made to Chapter 1 Administration, Chapter 5 Ba Fire Science, Chapter 7 Building Systems, Chapter 8 Fire Protection Systems, Chapter 12 Legal Considerat Chapter 14 Sources of Information, Chapter 15 Plannii Investigation, Chapter 17 Physical Evidence, Chapter
- nivesuganon, onapier n Frigoria Evidence, Onapier n Origin Determination, and Chapter 23 Incendiary Fires. There were several global revisions. For example, throughout NFPA 921 the word "boat" was changed to "vessel," because the term "vessel" is more inclusive (this mainly affects Chapter 29 Marine Fire Investigations); the acronyms for ac (alternating current) and dc (direct curren were capitalized (AC; DC); and "gypsum wallboard" was changed to "gypsum board" (because gypsum board
